Recently, I've had several discussions with people in our Region regarding how many months ABCOPAD has been in transition. Since Pastor Frank Frischkorn announced his plans to step down from being our Executive in 2021, ABCOPAD has been in a long season of transition. It's hard to believe it is now 2024, and the transitional season continues.

During a phone conversation with ABCOPAD Vice President Lori Jennings, Lori explained that the Regional Executive Pastor Search Committee has been hard at work for almost a year, with very few breaks, all to move the Region forward as quickly as possible.

I know that is true. I shared with Lori that often, when following Jesus, it is more about the Journey than the destination. This is a common theme throughout Scripture. All of us are familiar with the Children of Israel wandering in the Wilderness for a generation before entering the Promised Land. God needed the Children of Israel to learn many valuable lessons before entering the land he promised to Abraham and his descendants. It was more about the Journey and less about the destination.

God taught the Israelites to trust him for everything during their time in the Wilderness. They learned to trust God for the water they would drink and the food they would eat. God would also teach them to work as a team, a necessary requirement for the battles they would face to possess the land. God forged the Nation of Israel during their 40 years in the Wilderness. It was more about the Journey than the destination.

ABCOPAD has been on a similar journey. God has used the last two-plus years to teach our Region to trust Him. Our Region has been active for the past 24-plus months. We have tried new staffing models, adapted long-standing ministries, and created new programs. We have built new teams of people to conduct and grow Regional ministry.

I want to thank President Bryon Luke and Vice President Lori Jennings for the beautiful way they have provided information and updates during our Journey. Before our Christmas Break, Bryon and Lori provided a recap of 2023. In case you missed it, we are including the recap in this month's issue of Notes and News. Thank you for continuing your Journey with us. Thank you for all your prayers and support over the past two-plus years of transition. Thank you for your patience and understanding as we have tried new things and learned throughout the process. God is NOT done. Two thousand twenty-four promises to be another year of walking by faith on this Journey of following Jesus together.

#### Search Committee Update:

Our ABCOPAD Search Committee has been meeting at least twice a month and each Committee member worked on tasks individually since May of this year, to find our next Regional Executive Pastor. It is quite a process! Rev. Soozi Whitten-Ford, Interim Associate General Secretary for Regional Ministries, ABCUSA, has provided guidance and support to our committee throughout the process. This valuable benefit was provided to our Region, at no cost. We've had 9 great candidates apply and interviews and discussions are ongoing.

The Executive Committee of the Board expects to recommend a candidate for Regional Executive Pastor to the full ABCOPAD Board in the first quarter of 2024.

Our Regional American Baptist Women have been on the move this year! <sup>13</sup> But the angel said to him: "Do not be afraid, Zechariah; your prayer has been heard. Your wife Elizabeth will bear you a son, and you are to call him John...

<sup>18</sup> Zechariah asked the angel, "How can I be sure of this? I am an old man and my wife is well along in years."
<sup>19</sup> The angel said to him, "I am Gabriel. I stand in the presence of God, and I have been sent to speak to you and to tell you this good news. <sup>20</sup> And now you will be silent and not able to speak until the day this happens, because you did not believe my words, which will come true at their appointed time." (Luke 1:13, 18-20)

During Advent at my church (GraceCrossing Community, Phoenixville) we focused our attention on the individuals who surrounded the birth of Jesus. Two of the people I talked about were Zechariah (the father of John the Baptist) Simeon, who was present at the dedication of Jesus at the Temple.

As I reflected on Simeon, one of the things that struck me was the similarity between him and Zechariah. They were both devout elderly men who were men of prayer. And they both were approaching the final season of their lives. But they approached it somewhat differently.

As the scripture passage above indicates, when Gabriel told Zechariah that the Lord was about to miraculously answer his prayers by giving him and Elizabeth the child they had longed for all of their lives, he responded in doubt. I have to admit something if I am honest. I am 64 years old. If someone told me I was about to be a father again, I might not only say (in essence) "Are you sure?!" I think my head might explode!

But then again, I have never laid eyes (knowingly at least) on an angel. And I would like to think that if I had that kind of encounter my heart would be more open to the miraculous work of God. That seemed to be what the Lord expected of Zechariah because when he expressed his doubts, he was (temporarily) struck dumb as a consequence. Now let's turn our attention to Simeon:

<sup>25</sup> Now there was a man in Jerusalem called Simeon, who was righteous and devout. He was waiting for the consolation of Israel, and the Holy Spirit was on him. <sup>26</sup> It had been revealed to him by the Holy Spirit that he would not die before he had seen the Lord's Messiah. <sup>27</sup> Moved by the Spirit, he went into the temple courts. When the parents brought in the child Jesus to do for him what the custom of the Law required,
 <sup>28</sup> Simeon took him in his arms and praised God, saying: <sup>29</sup> "Sovereign Lord, as you have promised, you may now dismiss your servant in peace.
 <sup>30</sup> For my eyes have seen your salvation,
 <sup>31</sup> which you have prepared in the sight of all nations: <sup>32</sup> a light for revelation to the Gentiles, and the glory of your people Israel." (Luke 2:25-31)

So, while Zechariah doubted the Lord in his crucial moment, Simeon praised God and celebrated his answered prayers. What was the difference between them? After all, Luke 1:6 says Zechariah was "righteous in the sight of God, observing all the Lord's commands and decrees blamelessly".

It seems the difference had to do with the Holy Spirit. The verses above declare that "the Holy Spirit was on" Simeon and that the Spirit revealed he would not die before seeing the Messiah. And it says he was "moved by the Spirit" to go into the Temple the day that Jesus was being dedicated by his parents.

Even though Zechariah had prayed for many years for the child that the Lord granted him, he had clearly stopped expecting that prayer to be answered. Simeon, on the other hand, also prayed but he did so expectantly and with a sense of inner assurance that the Lord would fulfill His promise to him.

I suspect that many of you reading this are (like me) not "spring chickens" any more. As we look forward to the year ahead of us, these stories speak to me about my prayer life. What am I praying for as I approach the final season of my life? Am I in tune with the Holy Spirit? Am I seeking God's priorities or my own? Am I praying expectantly or am I just going through the motions?

What are you praying for in 2024? How fervently are you offering those prayers? It seems to me that if we just go through the motions of prayer, without any real vision for the future or expectations that God is going to do great things, we too will be struck dumb. We will have nothing to say to the world around us, or even to the church that is (or should be) so dear to us.

May the Lord grant you an inspired vision for the works of His salvation. And may you finish this season of your life well! God is not finished with us yet!

I had a learning experience a couple of weeks ago while chatting with a couple of young adults in my congregation. We were chatting about the role of the church in a culture that has shifted over the last few decades. I told them at one point we lived in a culture where we, as the church, could have a "Field of Dreams" mindset – that if you build it, they will come. If you build a good Sunday school or VBS, people will come...if you build a good worship service, people will come, etc. We don't live in that culture anymore. We live in a culture where people don't respond to the church in the same ways they once did. We live in a culture where the church needs to make repeated, concerted efforts to invite people into the community of Christ. We live in a culture where hospitality speaks volumes. I shared with them my thought that we would be in a better place if we focused on being more hospitable (a welcoming community of loving and serving strangers) and invitational (persistently and lovingly inviting people to join the church community). I shared with them that we can be persistently opening doors for people to walk through to participate in the community of the church.

As I spoke about Field of Dreams, the young adults stared back at me with blank faces. They had no idea what that was or had ever seen the movie. So, I had to back up a bit and tell them that Field of Dreams was a baseball movie from 1989 starring Kevin Costner (known more as John Dutton in Yellowstone than his famous roles in Dances with Wolves, The Bodyguard or Robin Hood) about a man who hears a phrase from the heavens (If you build it, he will come) that changes his life. Here is the lesson that I learned: in using the Field of Dreams metaphor, I realized in the conversation I was expecting these two young adults to be on my turf to understand what I was talking about. I expected them to know the Field of Dreams metaphor. That movie was released before they were born and was not a movie that everyone in their generation would have seen. If I wanted these young adults to understand what I was talking about, I needed to be on their turf in the conversation. I needed to use a metaphor they would understand. I needed to be hospitable to them in my part of the conversation. I needed to move toward them instead of expecting them to move toward me.

Many times in our congregations we expect those outside of the church to come onto our turf (which is usually showing up at the Sunday morning service) to get connected to the church. In that expectation, we are asking those outside of the church to step over a huge barrier to get connected. Would it be better for us as the church to step over that barrier toward them? Should we go into the place where non-churchgoers live/work/play in order to engage them?

One of the works of the church is to go to the places where non-churchgoers are and engage them on their turf. Our posture should be one of going towards people instead of waiting for people to come to us. In this culture we can no longer be of the mindset of "If we build it, they will come."

In 2024, let's go outside the walls of the church building and engage people where they are. It is clear that there are barriers between the church and the world. Many times we have expected the world to overcome those barriers to connect to the church. Maybe it is time for us to overcome the barriers to connect to the world.
