

Joshua 4:1-3 When the whole nation had finished crossing the Jordan, the Lord said to Joshua, “Choose twelve men from among the people, one from each tribe, and tell them to take up twelve stones from the middle of the Jordan, from right where the priests are standing, and carry them over with you and put them down at the place where you stay tonight.”

Joshua 4:19-24 On the tenth day of the first month the people went up from the Jordan and camped at Gilgal on the eastern border of Jericho. And Joshua set up at Gilgal the twelve stones they had taken out of the Jordan. He said to the Israelites, “In the future when your descendants ask their parents, ‘What do these stones mean?’”²² tell them, ‘Israel crossed the Jordan on dry ground.’ For the Lord your God dried up the Jordan before you until you had crossed over. The Lord your God did to the Jordan what he had done to the Red Sea[a] when he dried it up before us until we had crossed over. He did this so that all the peoples of the earth might know that the hand of the Lord is powerful and so that you might always fear the Lord your God.”

Recently, I had the great joy of participating in the Installation service of Rev. Dr. Kevin Roberts at the Jefferson Church in Southwest ABCOPAD. Rev. Cristy Wise (Southwest GPS) did an excellent job delivering the morning message and charging Pastor Kevin and the Congregation to be faithful in this new relationship. I was privileged to officially welcome Pastor Kevin and lead the “Laying on of Hands” as Pastor Cristy, the church leaders, and I prayed a blessing on Pastor Kevin and his wife, Debbie. The installation service is a milestone moment for the Jefferson Baptist Church as the church begins a new chapter of ministry.

The installation service at Jefferson is the first of four installation services that will take place in the Southwest corner of our Region, with 9 or 10 installation services taking place across ABCOPAD over the next four months. Each of these installation services marks a milestone moment for each congregation, officially welcoming their new pastor and a new partnership in ministry.

But installations are not the only milestone moments being marked in our Region. Recently, Rev. Charles (Chuck) Fox (FBC, Pittsburgh since 2017) and in October Rev. Howard Irwin (Woodlawn, Aliquippa since 2008) are both celebrating 40 years of ordained ministry. Over the last few weeks, ABCOPAD has received letters of invitation from Baptist Tabernacle, Wilkes Barre, celebrating 100 years in their sanctuary, and FBC, Greensburg and Mount Zion, Altoona, each celebrating 150 years of ministry. Pastoral Leaders and Congregations are marking milestones in their ministries throughout the Region.

God calls us to celebrate milestone moments. In Joshua 4, God commanded Joshua to have a leader from each tribe of Israel select a stone from the Jordan River; where, the nation crossed on dry ground. These twelve stones would become a monument, a milestone commemorating God’s miraculous provision as Israel crossed the Jordan and entered the Promised Land. Future generations would hear the story of God’s faithfulness and love, bringing His people out of bondage and into a land of abundance.

When a church performs an installation service, it is an opportunity to celebrate God’s provision of a pastor. In our current culture, finding a pastor can be challenging. Ask any Search Committee member in ABCOPAD, and they will tell you that finding a pastor is no simple task. With fewer and fewer people going into ministry and many pastoral leaders deciding to retire or leave local church ministry, pastoral searches can take 12 to 18 months. Often, a search committee must look outside the ABC Family for its next pastoral leader using online job sites such as Indeed or ChurchStaff.com. As a result, Search Committees need to be far more discerning and do much more vetting before a call is made. While the Search Committee may feel exhausted once a pastor is called and tempted to simply skip an installation service, it is important to celebrate this milestone in the church’s history. God’s provision is a reason to celebrate.

Years after the initial ordination/certification and installation, some pastors can celebrate long and fruitful ordained

or certified ministry at a local church. This, too, is a reason to rejoice and be thankful. All pastors encounter challenges and difficulties in ministry. It is often tempting to quit or leave a church hoping to find “greener pastures” in the next congregation. When pastoral leaders have remained faithful to their calling and committed to a local church, God needs to be praised, and the pastor should receive words of appreciation from their congregation.

Finally, when a church reaches a milestone of 50, 75, 100, 125, 150, or more years of ministry, this is a reason to celebrate. Before the pandemic, many congregations were struggling, but now, after the pandemic, ABCOPAD is having numerous conversations with congregations considering closure. Some statisticians have reported as much as 40 percent of worshippers

have not returned to church following the pandemic. As a result, churches have experienced a significant decline in contributions and people willing to accept leadership roles in local church ministry. For those who have remained committed to their congregation, there can be an overwhelming sense of fatigue and frustration trying to keep the doors of the church open and ministry continuing. When a significant anniversary avails itself, that is a reason to celebrate and give God thanks.

ABCOPAD staff, when available, love to participate in these celebrations. Being with our ministry partners is a joy as they thank God for his faithfulness, love, and provision. Our God is fantastic and is always worthy of our praise and thanksgiving. Thank you for being a partner in ministry. God Bless, and know how much we appreciate you.

Recently, the infrastructure of the AB Men of Pennsylvania and Delaware (aka ABMOPAD) has deteriorated and needs to be rebuilt from the ground up. As a first step, we are organizing a series of gatherings to prayerfully seek God’s will for the future. I am passionate about this.

When I was 5 years old, my dad was killed in an industrial accident. My mom (who hadn’t finished high school because her own father died when she was young and she needed to get a job) raised us by herself for several years by living on SS income. I found myself seeking good male role models as I came of age; my church (Emporium, First) provided me with that guidance. Over the years, the church became my extended family and it seemed natural to me when God called me into the ministry as a pastor.

Since then, I have seen how a strong men’s ministry shapes lives and strengthens the backbone of the body of Christ. I have seen men involved in the Promise Keepers movement transform congregational life. Men who had little interest in the church suddenly caught fire!

For many years, ABMOPAD has actively supported disaster relief projects and held retreats and conferences to encourage men and boys to follow and serve Christ. However today, the relief trailers are sitting idle and the leadership is in disarray. With your help, we can change that.

Last month, a retreat attended by 25 men was held at Camp Ichthus. We discussed and prayed about the situation and plan to hold a follow-up event on November 10-11 at Camp Ichthus in Palmerton, PA.

The Spirit of a Church Leader

Numbers 11:16-17, 24-25

¹⁶So the Lord said to Moses, “Gather for me seventy of the elders of Israel, whom you know to be the elders of the people and officers over them; bring them to the tent of meeting, and have them take their place there with you. ¹⁷I will come down and talk with you there; and I will take some of the spirit that is on you and put it on them; and they shall bear the burden of the people along with you so that you will not bear it all by yourself. . . . ²⁴So Moses went out and told the people the words of the Lord; and he gathered seventy elders of the people, and placed them all around the tent. ²⁵Then the Lord came down in the cloud and spoke to him, and took some of the spirit that was on him and put it on the seventy elders; and when the spirit rested upon them, they prophesied. But they did not do so again.

Let’s start with the obvious. A leader’s spirit matters. And this is the case no matter the leadership position we hold—from Pastor to Board Member to Director of Music. It is impossible to be a good leader if we don’t have God’s spirit. Meaning we are caring, compassionate, patient, understanding and filled with love for others. An unfortunate result of being a leader with God’s Spirit is that we often overdo “it.” Important, many of these “its” differ from one leader to the next. For some, we don’t

want to delegate because we want it done the way we think it should be done. For some, we take on many, if not all, of the responsibilities of the financial committee, Deacons, Trustees, Christian Education Board, and the Administrative Board. In addition, we prepare and deliver sermons and Bible lessons; as well as casting the vision for our various ministries. Told you. Often, we overdo “it.”

For us to be effective leaders, we must trust God to guide others to accomplish the many ministry tasks that we are currently endeavoring to complete alone. Here’s where the spirit of the leader is even more important. As God told Moses, He has blessed us with people in our ministries to help us manage the leadership load. I know that we think we don’t have anyone to help do whatever we are trying to do. But God’s word is true. And, He has blessed us with some who will help us; we just must look for them. And once identified, we need to “have them to take their place there with [us]”. Once we do our part, God will do His. He will **“take some of the spirit that [is on us] and put it on them”**.

Now, they will help shoulder our ministry loads. They will bear the burden of the people along with us. We will no longer be relegated to doing it all alone. No, they won’t do things in the exact same manner that we do them. But indeed, God will guide them just as He guides us.

But let’s not overlook that the spirits of these people will be our spirits. Please take a moment and consider this fact. The spirits of these people will be our spirits. So, let’s look at our own spirits first. Determine our spiritual strengths and weaknesses. And then, make it a priority to work towards truly having God-like spirits. Our ministries depend on it.




