

Last month, I received a couple of email messages regarding ABCOPAD's position on Immigration and what is currently happening in our culture. One pastoral leader expressed frustration with seeing other Denominational Leaders make public statements on behalf of their constituents regarding the treatment of Immigrants. They wanted to encourage me to make a public statement for our Region.

I tried calling this pastor so we could talk about their frustration. While I know this pastor understands Baptist Polity, their frustration got the better of them. Although I've not had a

chance to chat with this pastor, I received a very kind email apologizing for the initial email, letting me know they needed to spend more time praying and thinking about their personal responsibility regarding Immigration.



While I am not able to make a blanket political statement on behalf of our 280+ congregations, as Baptists, we believe in the authority of Scripture. We are people of the Book, and the Bible does have some very clear statements about Immigration and how God's People care for the foreigners in our land.

Old Testament Prophets repeatedly call upon God's People to be kind and gracious to foreigners and displaced people.

Deuteronomy 10:18-19 He defends the cause of the fatherless and the widow, and loves the foreigner residing among you, giving them food and clothing. And you are to love those who are foreigners, for you yourselves were foreigners in Egypt.

Leviticus 19:33-34 When a foreigner resides among you in your land, do not mistreat them. The foreigner residing among you must be treated as your nativeborn. Love them as yourself, for you were foreigners in Egypt. I am the Lord your God.

Psalm 146:9 The Lord watches over the foreigner and sustains the fatherless and the widow, but he frustrates the ways of the wicked.

Zechariah 7:9-10 This is what the Lord Almighty said: 'Administer true justice; show mercy and compassion to one another. Do not oppress the widow or the fatherless, the foreigner or the poor. Do not plot evil against each other.



In a recent television commercial, we are reminded that Jesus, Mary, and Joseph were refugees fleeing political violence in Israel. While I am not sure about the background to the advertisements for "He Gets Us," I did appreciate the video's content and the reminder that Jesus and his family were refugees.

My family was an immigrant to the United States. In the 1950s, my grandparents worked hard to send their three sons and one daughter (my mother) to the US. As Christian Armenians, my grandparents sought to protect their children from political violence in Syria, a predominantly Muslim country. One of the proudest days of my mother's life was becoming a naturalized citizen of the United States along with my three uncles.

As followers of Jesus and people of the Bible, Scripture provides clear instructions regarding how we care for immigrants in our country. As we all struggle with this complex and often challenging issue, we must be faithful to God's Word.

Thank you for your partnership in ministry. Know you remain in my prayers.

I recently discovered a book by Henri Nouwen that is 20+ years old. A dear friend of mine recommended it to me. Her reading preferences and mine often diverge. She likes poetry, for instance, and I simply am not equipped to understand it half of the time. ©

So when she said "you should read this one," I was a bit skeptical. I feared endless metaphors that sailed over my head. But she persisted, "this is the best reminder of who we are in Christ, outside of Scripture, I've read."

I picked up *Life of the Beloved* one rainy Saturday afternoon and decided I'd skim through the opening chapter. When Nouwen said to his unbelieving friend that he was going to explain the Gospel by saying "all I want you to know is that you are the beloved," though, I was hooked. In a single sentence, he reminded me of what it means to be a Christian.

Let's be honest: that's not the language many of us use to describe our relationship with

Jesus. When asked what it means to be a Christian, does "it means I am the beloved of God" spring to
your lips? Or does your response sound a bit more like mine: "To be a Christian means I believe that Jesus
is the Son of God who lived a sinless life, died a sacrificial death, and lives an eternal life now." Or maybe
you go for "to be a Christian means I say 'yes' to certain things and 'no' to others." Don't get me wrong,
both of those responses are true, but maybe they aren't hitting the mark.

To be a believer in Jesus Christ means that your absolute core identity – no matter what you do or don't do, say or don't say – is that you are always the beloved of the Father. Make 6 figures? You're the beloved. Barely scraping by? You're the beloved. Have a squeaky-clean past? You're the beloved. Carry a past that's riddled with screwups and pain? You're the beloved. Facing a really, extremely dark season? You're the beloved. And the beloved doesn't walk alone.

To be the beloved means I can look at my own sin & shortcomings, acknowledge them and, by God's grace, grow up. To be the beloved guarantees that God really does use *all* things for my good and His glory, because He will waste nothing in His beloved's life. As the beloved, I obey not to earn God's favor

but simply because I already have it. To be the beloved allows me to find that my security & significance, purpose & person cannot be defined by any other person, position or perspective. I am the beloved. And nothing can change that.

And, friend, all of that (and so much more) is true of you, too. Because to be in Christ is to be the beloved. That's why the Gospel changes our everything.

5 Things We Should Be Doing...

...During the second administration of President Donald J. Trump

Polarization. A term that comes to mind as we embark upon the second administration of President Donald J. Trump. The current mood in our Country

reminds us of the often-quoted opening lines from Charles Dickens' A Tale of Two Cities.

"It was the best of times, it was the worst of times, it was the age of wisdom, it was the age of foolishness, it was the epoch of belief, it was the epoch of incredulity, it was the season of light, it was the season of darkness, it was the spring of hope, it was the winter of despair."

Yes, this is exactly it. There are many that welcome our President into the Oval Office; while there are just as many others that dread his return. And there are few people in the middle. Indeed, polarization. I find it interesting that people living in the same country, living in the same state, living in the same city/borough/township, serving the True and Living God, and even worshiping in the same local church can have such differing opinions about what is occurring in our Country.

We're all different, yet we are the same.

No matter the location of our churches, our congregations are filled with people on both ends of the spectrum. Some welcome, and some dread. The question for us as Pastors, Preachers and Lay Leaders should be how do we minister to congregants with such differing and opposing views? Be patient. When we hear rhetoric "from the other side" we often become uneasy and even respond with bursts of anger. Of course, this is not how Jesus taught us to respond to one another. Although we whole-heartedly disagree, be patient. There's no need to insert our personal views into the conversations. Instead, stay quiet. Keep peace.

Love. Truly, what this Country needs more of is love. The in-depth caring for others that causes us to put their needs before our own. Assuredly, this love should begin with the religious leaders within our communities—that's us. Show love to others no matter their political views. Respond with tenderness, as love is what love does. We fail to demonstrate God's love when we are combative.

Pray. Begin with praying for President Trump and his administration. The choices and decisions that are made over the next 4 years effect all of us in some manner. Regardless of whether he was our candidate or not; regardless of whether we voted for him or not; regardless of whether we like him or not, he is our President. He deserves the respect that comes with the Office. So, let's pray for him. Let's also pray for one another; and that we will have peace in this Country.

Trusting God with the Journey

Hello from the newbie! I am certainly not a newbie to the Region or even to many of you. As I step into this new role, I am thinking of all the names and

faces of those who were a part of my journey into ministry from being a young pastor's kid to being a pastor today. It has been a long, good, difficult, and fun journey that I continue to travel today.

That journey has me thinking about all the travel we do in our lives today. When we want to connect with others, we are not bound by the small geographic area we find ourselves in. That was a problem for a previous time in history. Today, we can hop in our cars and be across the state in a few hours (or more if you live in the corners). The convenience of being able to be connected over great distances is something I don't want to take for granted.

On the other side of that convenience is the struggle of our travels. I currently serve in South Central PA. As I write this, my children are home with a virtual-at-home-learning day. They have now had 7 days of school affected by weather in some way. As a church, we struggled with the choice of canceling service for one Sunday in January due to road conditions. I know for those in our northern churches, the snow we got here may not have raised an eyebrow. But for us down here, any hint of snow or ice in the forecast makes everyone start to worry and plan ahead.

For me, I don't want to ever cancel opportunities for people to gather because snow might happen. I get frustrated when my plans change because of things I can't control. Have you ever felt the frustration that ministry is not going your way? Maybe it's the weather. Maybe it's a situation with your people that you don't know how to handle. Maybe it's walking alongside a family that is grieving the loss of a loved one wondering what to say. Maybe it's looking for wisdom for the best-next step to take without knowing exactly which way to go.

My guess is we have all been there - frustrated by the things that aren't going our way and that God isn't putting things together with "our" plan in mind. For my church, I shouldn't see snow as keeping us from what God wants. Rather I should look at the ways in which I can encourage the people under my care to use that time to keep working on their own journey with Jesus. For us, in our journeys with Jesus, we need to stop seeing the obstacles as problems and instead see them as God's way of refocusing our hearts back to Him. I really don't have control at all. It should never be my plan in the first place. God's plan is better than mine and often doesn't have my comfort as its first priority. 1 Peter 5 has a lot to say to us about our role in leading the flock entrusted to us. I'll end with the words from 1 Peter 5:7: "Cast all your anxiety on Him because He cares for you." Next time, spend less time on the weather and road apps and more time connected to the Source who truly cares for you.

Answering the Call: A Vision for Men of Faith

Have you ever wondered what could happen if the men of our churches truly united in purpose and faith? Imagine hundreds of brothers in Christ across Pennsylvania and Delaware, not just gathering for meetings, but transforming our communities through the power of collective faith and action.

Let's be honest – being a man of faith in today's world isn't easy. We face challenges our fathers never imagined:

- The constant pressure to prioritize career success over family and faith;
- A culture that often mocks or misunderstands Christian values;

Think back to the great movements of faith throughout history. The twelve disciples weren't just followers of Jesus – they were a brotherhood that changed the world. When Peter struggled with doubt, his brothers were there. When Thomas questioned, the community supported him. When Paul faced trials, he had Silas and Timothy by his side.

"Iron sharpens iron, and one man sharpens another." (Proverbs 27:17) These words paint a powerful picture of what could be. Imagine walking into any Baptist church in Pennsylvania or Delaware and finding a vibrant community of men who:

- Challenge each other to grow deeper in their faith;
- Share life's burdens and celebrations together;
- Mentor younger men in the ways of godly living;
- Unite in prayer for our families, churches, and communities;
- Serve together to meet real needs in our neighborhoods.

- Unashamed of their faith in an increasingly secular world;
- Ready to mentor the next generation in biblical manhood;
- Standing firm in one spirit, as Paul urged the Philippians;
- Committed to supporting each other through life's challenges;
- Eager to serve their communities in practical ways;

Annual Reporting Requirements for Pennsylvania Department of State

All Entities Registered with the Pennsylvania Department of State are now obligated to submit an Annual Report to the Pennsylvania Department of State. This new annual filing requirement, enacted through Act 122 of 2022, now replaces Pennsylvania's former decennial filing requirement for entities.

Pennsylvania Reporting Entities

Annual Reports must be submitted for the following types of entities:

- Pennsylvania corporations (both for-profit and non-profit)
- Pennsylvania partnerships, including limited liability general partnerships, electing partnerships that are not limited partnerships, limited partnerships (including limited liability limited partnerships)
- Pennsylvania LLCs
- Pennsylvania professional associations
- Pennsylvania business trusts

Reported Information

Each Annual Report must include the entity's name, jurisdiction of formation, registered office address, name of at least one governor (director, member, partner, etc.), names and titles of principal officers, address of principal office, and the entity number issued by the Pennsylvania Department of State.

Costs: The Annual Report filing fee will be \$7, however there is no fee associated with submitting an Annual Report for a non-profit organization.

How to Report

Annual Reports may be submitted online at www.file.dos.pa.gov, through a registered account with the Pennsylvania Business Filing Services system and will be automatically approved. Entities may also submit an Annual Report on paper with the filed document returned by mail.

Annual Deadlines and Penalties

The Pennsylvania Department of State will mail a notice to each reporting entity at least two months in advance of the entity's filing deadline. The deadline for submission of the Annual Report each year is dependent on the type of entity submitting the report. The deadlines are as follows:

- All corporations (for-profit and non-profit) must submit the Annual Report by June 30;
- All limited liability companies must submit the Annual Report by September 30; and
- All other entities must submit an Annual Report by December 31.

Entities may submit an Annual Report at any time during the calendar year prior to the entity's deadline.

Penalties for failure to submit an Annual Report include administrative dissolution, termination, cancellation, and loss of the protection of the entity's name. However, there is a transitionary period before such penalties will take effect, enforcement measures for the Annual Reporting requirement will not take effect until 2027.

If an entity fails to file an Annual Report during or in any year following 2027, it will be subject to administrative dissolution or administrative cancellation six (6) months after the due date for the entity's Annual Report. At this point, the entity's name will become available for use by other entities.

Each fund has specific guidelines for the purpose and use of these grants. In 2024, we celebrated 30 years of making grants to the ABCOPAD churches and organizations. 2025 promises to be another record year for available funds and our Regional Pastors and GPS Staff are ready to help you with this process.

As always, the Mission Allocation Committee is looking for churches who have committed resources of funding and people to these new ministry concepts. Your congregation should have completed their Church Annual Report as well as supporting the Partners in Ministry offering which is the main source of funding for Regional Ministries. Contact one of the ABCOPAD offices, the Regional Pastors or your GPS for additional information and applications.

Pennsylvania Sales Tax Exemption Certificates

ABCOPAD serves as the parent organization for the State in verifying the Sales Tax Exemption Certificates for our churches. I am in the process of verifying the list for the State. New Certificates will be available and mailed to churches before they expire on March 15, 2025. There is nothing you need to do.

Cumulative Comparison Figures

United Mission Basics (includes UMB and Love Gift) is behind through December 2024 by (\$31,055). The decrease in United Mission amounts to (\$24,996) less in actual dollars that ABCOPAD received thru December.

Partners in Ministry is behind by (\$6,974) thru Dec. This decrease includes \$30,000 from the sale of property and 2 gift annuities @ \$5,000.

Over & Above is the ABCOPAD Women's Ministries offering. ABCOPAD Women's Ministries supports ABCOPAD monthly.

AFC is behind by (\$11,956) thru Dec. This decrease amounts to (\$3,507) less in actual dollars that ABCOPAD received. ABCOPAD has received (\$35,476) less in actual dollars from UM, AFC and PIM thru December as compared to 2023.
